4-H & FFA YOUTH EXHIBITS & LIVESTOCK

4-H & FFA Livestock Exhibit Rules

- Health inspection required for all animals stalled on fairgrounds. Health inspections from an accredited veterinarian must be dated within 7 days of final check-in for livestock animals (Wednesday July 27, 2011).
- 4-H and FFA livestock exhibits including poultry and rabbits (excluding horses) must be on the grounds by noon Wednesday. Exhibitors violating this rule will not show or participate in the livestock sale. Exceptions by emergency only. Decisions made by at least five livestock committee members at weigh-in.
- Market livestock begin weigh-in at 1 p.m.; order to be posted. Exhibitors must have proof of ownership (bill of sale) prior to fair. Brand inspection required for beef, sheep and goats. Bill of sale required for swine.
- No bulls, lactating cows, rams or boars allowed in showmanship.
- All exhibitors must show their own animal at both the Sublette County and the Wyoming State Fair. If a youth has multiple animals within a class at either venue, then the youth may designate FFA or 4-H youth to assist in exhibiting the animals. Furthermore any youth exhibiting livestock at either the Sublette County or the Wyoming State Fair must be the animal's primary caretaker for the entire duration of the event. All pens must be cleaned and animals fed and watered on a daily basis by the exhibiting youth. Failure to do so will result in removal of the unattended animals from the Fair Grounds.
- The Fair Veterinarian shall make the final determination at any time during fair when an animal is deemed unfit to be on fair grounds due to health issues. At such time a youth is informed that an animal must leave the fair grounds, the fair veterinarian shall be accompanied by a fair board member and the FFA advisor and/or 4-H Extension Educator.
- All animals will remain tied or penned in the buildings.
- A 4-H or FFA member may sell only one animal.
- The top senior showman will be determined by judge's placing and be declared winners of their respective showmanship trophies.
- Animals used in showmanship must be owned and fitted by the exhibitor.
- There will be five classes of showmanship; 1st year, junior, intermediate, senior 4-H, and FFA.
- There will be no weigh-backs except at the discretion of the livestock committee. If any contestant uses artificial means, such as drenching, to make an animal meet requirements, that individual will be barred from competing at the fair. Should an animal not make weight, the contestant will still be allowed to show at the fair, but not to sell.
- Market steer classes will be determined by hip height.
- It is recommended that there will be up to 10 entries in a livestock class. Beyond 10 entries, the entries will be broken such that there will be a minimum of five in each lot. If the class is divided by number, the division will be determined on scale order.
- Exhibitors must declare animals destined for state fair Friday evening at the state fair meeting.
- An individual animal may be shown in more than one class providing the animal/exhibitor is eligible for the class.
- Market hogs weighing greater than 280 lbs. will be shown in a special class that is ineligible for the championship round.
- Market hogs weighing greater than 280 lbs. may sell in the sale ring only if the youth agrees to be paid only on 280 lbs.
- Any livestock deemed uncontrollable by the superintendent in charge will be excused from showing on the fairgrounds depending upon the severity of the situation.
- Fitting rule: A 4-H or FFA member is expected to fit their own animal at fair. However, in the interest of safety and the educational mission of 4-H and FFA programs, a 4-H or FFA member may be assisted by another 4-H or FFA member, volunteer leader or an immediate family member.
- No private treaty sale advertising at the fair.

STATE FAIR EXHIBITS: Only bona fide Wyoming 4-H members are eligible to compete for prizes offered in the

- Fitting rule: A 4-H or FFA member is expected to fit their own animal at fair. However, in the interest of safety and the educational mission of 4-H and FFA programs, a 4-H or FFA member may be assisted by another 4-H or FFA member, volunteer leader or an immediate family member.

- If the 4-H member is found to be in violation of the fitting rule, he will not be allowed to show in any 4-H division at the fair, including the showmanship contest.
- The mission of 4-H is "to empower youth to reach their full potential, working and learning in partnership with caring adults."

4-H Division of State Fair. A member must be enrolled in the project (at the State 4-H Office) in which he/she exhibits and the exhibit must be the result of the 4-H member's project during the current 4-H year. Said entries must be exhibited at county fairs and receive state fair designation.

Sublette County Junior Livestock Sale Rules and Regulations

All consignors in the Sublette County Junior Livestock Sale are required to sign the Livestock sale rules and regulations. All rules and regulations will be strictly adhered to by the Sale Association. Youth wishing to appeal one of the rules or regulations must do so IN PERSON at the pre-sale Junior Livestock Sale Association meeting on Friday July 29 at 5 pm in the livestock barn. Leaders and parents are welcome to accompany the youth for support but the youth must present their own case.

1. Access to the Jr. Livestock sale is a privilege, not a right.
2. Market animals must have been grain fed. "Grass fat" animals will not be allowed participation in this premium market animal sale. The judge will also have the prerogative to declare an animal unfit for participation in the sale by awarding a white ribbon. All judges are clearly instructed that animals awarded white ribbons will not be allowed to sell in the Junior Livestock sale.
3. Market beef over 1050 lbs, market lambs over 90 lbs, market swine over 200 lbs, and market goats are eligible for sale. Smaller framed market beef that do not weigh 1050lbs may also gain eligibility to the sale using the following formula: measured hip height x 22.5= minimum accepted market weight x .97 (3% allowance for weight loss due to stress) = minimum accepted weight.
4. Participants may sell one animal.
5. Participants must have attended a local or county field day.
6. There will be at least 6 meetings for a 4-H project member, of which the member must attend at least 50% (3). This attendance will be certified by leaders.
7. Members must have done a demonstration or a public speaking appearance at the club or county level. This will be certified by leaders and county presentation volunteers.
8. Members must own the animal by ownership deadline (Feb 1st for market beef and June 1st for sheep/goat/swine).
9. All 4-H and FFA members must have completed a Youth Quality Assurance Level I program their first year in a market livestock project. All members in their second year of the project must complete Youth Quality Assurance levels II and III (taught together).
10. Participants must have shown the animal in the **junior market livestock show** at the fair.
11. Checks will not be issued to participants until all buyers have paid the sale association.

12. Members will not receive their checks until they have submitted an addressed, stamped "Thank-You" to their buyer and turned their completed 4-H portfolio in by September 12, 2011 to the Extension Office. FFA members will receive their sale checks from the FFA advisor once all FFA requirements are completed. For those members that run "thank-you" ads in the newspaper, a hand written "Thanks-you" note written to your buyer must still be provided to the Extension Office.
13. There will be a 3% commission retained by the sale association on the sale price.
14. Consignors may pick and choose which animal they will sell. There is no requirement to sell champions.
15. Once sold, the animal belongs to the buyer. Sale suggests sellers accommodate buyer's needs.
16. The sale association will bear no responsibility for private treaty animals; sales, transportation etc.
17. It is the member's responsibility to respond to request for promotion information.
18. The sale association will pay brand inspection fees.
19. Members must reserve state fair privilege prior to sale.
20. The sale association encourages buyers to make payment on sale day and will send invoices within the week.
21. The sale association may assess late payment charges on outstanding accounts (18% APR).
22. All rabbits must be dressed on delivery to purchaser.

The 4-H Leaders Council policy that parents and member should be aware of:

CODE OF CONDUCT

- Members are to refrain from using alcoholic beverages or other drugs at any 4-H function. Aspirin and other similar products and drugs prescribed by a physician are exceptions.
- Violation by a member shall result in the loss of 4-H privileges for the remainder of the 4-H year, including exhibiting at the county fair, participating in the livestock sale, and attending the state fair.

- Adult volunteer leaders should adhere to the same high standard expected of the members.

CHAPERONING POLICY

Chaperones for county functions must be recognized 4-H leaders. A recognized leader is an individual who has successfully completed screening, leader training, and signed a 4-H Leader Agreement form (effective October 1 of the current year). Non-recognized 4-H leaders must not have unsupervised access to 4-H youth. This is particularly important for any overnight functions.

All birds must have a current certificate of veterinary inspection which will be checked at an offgrounds site. Any sick or diseased animals may not be allowed on grounds and/or be disqualified and must be removed from the grounds immediately.

Individual birds entered in trios or fryer pens will not be permitted to compete for individual prizes or compete as part of another trio or fryer pen.

All birds must be owned by the exhibitor by June 1, 2011 to be eligible to show.

If less than three (3) birds are entered in a class, they will be combined with a similar class as determined by show management.

Premium payouts in this division shall not exceed the established amount as determined by the Wyoming State Fair.

Section 1 – General Information

- The Junior Equine Show is limited to 4-H and FFA members.
- The Junior Equine Show will be held Monday, July 25 and Tuesday, July 26, 2011 starting at 8 a.m. both days.
- Mailed entries in the Junior Horse Show must be received by July 15, 2011. Hand-delivered or faxed entries must be stamped received at the Sublette County Extension Office by 5 p.m. July 15, 2011. No late entries will be accepted – no phone entries – no exceptions. Be sure to enter the proper age group.
- Horses should be on the grounds and ready to show at 8 a.m. sharp.
- Vaccinations are strongly recommended to be current before arriving at the Sublette County Fair. Recommended vaccinations: West Nile virus, EWT, rhino, influenza, and potomac horse fever. It is recommended that you consult with your veterinarian or animal health supplier to determine your vaccination program.
- Current certificates of veterinary health inspections are required for all stalled equine and must be presented to the horse show secretary upon arrival at the show. Certificates must have been written within 7 days of the horse show. All out-of-state horses must be tested negative to the AGID (Coggins) test for EAI within 12 months prior to entry.

Section 2 – Policies

- The show will be run according to the current Sublette County Fair Book and the Wyoming Junior Horse Rule Book.
- Exhibitor is responsible for the accuracy of the entry. Errors can constitute an ineligible entry.
- Any horse suspected of ill health may be dismissed from the fairgrounds with veterinarian recommendation.
- Members must be safety certified on any horse they enter and for every event they enter with that horse. In the event a member is unable to show the horse they have entered, a horse substitution may be made on show day provided the member is safety certified on that horse *and* the member's leader and /or veterinarian confirms the entered horse is unable to be shown for health reasons.
- Wearing of equestrian helmets is strongly encouraged.
- In the interest of safety, an exhibitor's horse may be saddled, bridled, and tack change made by someone other than the exhibitor. When an exhibitor needs assistance, a parent, 4-H leader, FFA advisor, junior leader, and/or friend is encouraged to provide that assistance and coaching prior to entering the arena.
- Absolutely no mistreatment of animals will be tolerated.
- Contestants and other persons may approach the judge with questions at the conclusion of the show each day.

Section 3 – Rules

- Exhibitors must have a Horse Safety Certification filed in the county extension office as of July 15, 2011 for any horse to be eligible for the Sublette County Fair.
 - No late entries will be accepted. No phone entries will be accepted. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**
 - Exhibitor not present for the last call into the arena will be denied entry into the class.
 - Dress code for all 4-H exhibitors at the Junior Horse Show will be black or blue jeans and a plain white, long-sleeved, western shirt with a collar or a Roper 4-H shirt, FFA members must be in official dress. Except for English riding classes, which require English attire.
 - Unsportsmanlike conduct (i.e. Inappropriate language/actions) by an exhibitor may be cause for immediate disqualification of the exhibitor from the show, at the judges discretion.
 - Unsportsmanlike conduct (i.e. Inappropriate language/actions) by a parent, leader, or others may be cause for immediate removal of the person from the Sublette County Fairgrounds at the discretion of the Fair Board.
 - An exhibitor is limited to two (2) horses per class (Showmanship, equitation classes, and hunter hack are limited to one horse per exhibitor). Please refer to section 2 - Policies on procedures for horses unable to show due to health reasons.
- Junior horse classes are defined as horses that are under the age of 5.
- First Year Showmanship class: This is for exhibitors in their first

year of the horse project, and 8, 9 or 10 years old. The exhibitor may enter both classes.

- The first year showmanship class will not count towards the all around.
- Halter classes will not count toward the All-Around.
- Ground Roping and Dummy Roping will not count toward All-Around point totals.
- For Ground Roping and Dummy Roping, the contestant (or contestant's horse) shall stand behind a line which is 8 feet from the Dummy's head (measured from the center of the horns). This distance shall be the same for all age divisions.
- All cattle classes are open to all youth who have passed the safety endorsement test. All working cow horse competitors that receive cattle will pay a \$25 stock charge. ALL entrants in cattle events must pay stock charge with entry.
- Each exhibitor/horse combination will be assigned exhibit numbers by the horse show secretary. The exhibitor is required to display the correct number when showing.
- There is a \$10 deposit on all stalls to be included with entry. Stall deposit will be refunded by review of stall boss when you strip your stall at the end of your stay.
- There will be all-around awards given in each age division: The point system for calculating the All-Around awards is as following:

4-H & FFA Round Robin Showmanship Contest

- The Round Robin Showmanship contest is an avenue for 4-H and FFA members to learn about other species of livestock. Each Round Robin Showman will not only be judged on the fitting and showing of their own animal, but also on their abilities in showing other species of livestock.
- Jackets will be awarded to the Grand and Reserve Champion Round Robin showman.
- The Sublette County Sale Association will award a \$200 scholarship to the winner of the Round Robin Showmanship contest and \$100 scholarship to the Reserve Champion. This award will be held for and awarded to winners in their second semester of college. Should a winner not qualify for the scholarship, it will be awarded to the Reserve Champion.
- Open to senior members (ages 14 - 18) who qualified in their respective showmanship contests: beef, lamb, swine, horse and goat.

- Eligible contestants will be contacted after qualifying with any details on time, locations and any additional information. Round Robin Awards Champion, Reserve Champion will receive awards.

Rules

- The top two senior showmen (grand champion 4-H and grand champion FFA) from the following livestock showmanship contests: beef, swine, horse, sheep and goat, will be eligible to compete in the round robin.
- In the event a member qualifies in more than one contest, he will compete in the round robin with the first animal he qualified with, allowing the second-place contestant in the second contest to move up, with the exception of goat and sheep. The top showman in goat and sheep will be required to show in that class and, if they have previously qualified in another species, the second-place contestant in that species will move up. The contestant will fit their own animal for show.
- Members must show the same animal they exhibited in the original division showmanship contest.
- There will be one judge for each species; however, the judges will confer on the fitting portion of the contest and give one total score per contestant.
- The judges will score each contestant up to 10 points for fitting; these points will be used only for tie-breaking.
- The contestants will be showing each species of animal for five minutes. The judges will give up to 10 points.
- Contestants must qualify in their contest in order to compete in the round robin. Also, judges will be picked prior to the fair and scorecards will be made.

General Rules and Regulations

Show animal exhibitors will be applicable to the 4-H Cat Show.

1. The “Household Pet” cat is of mixed breed or unknown descent.
2. A purebred cat is one belonging to a recognized breed with characteristics maintained through generations of unmixed descent; may be registered with a recognized registry.
3. Kittens must be at least 4 months old and not older than 8 months of age. Adult cats are older than 8 months of age. Because of susceptibility to disease, no kitten under 4 months of age will be accepted for competition.
4. No pregnant or nursing cats may be entered.
5. All cats and kittens must have their claws clipped. Declawed cats may enter the show and will not be counted down for declawing.
6. Do not enter your cat if you feel it will not be easily handled by the judge.
7. Each cat or kitten must be wearing a harness or collar (not a

safety collar) and a leash. The exhibitor must always wear the leash on their wrist for safety reasons.

8. Exhibitors must furnish their own carpet square during judging. Exhibitors must provide a proper cage or carrier for their cats/kittens. Exhibitors must bring their own litter and litter box.
9. All exhibitors should wear long sleeve shirts or blouses with trousers or skirts. No shorts.

Health Requirements

Cats must have current rabies and distemper shots. It is strongly suggested, but not mandatory, that all entries have the combination vaccinations, plus feline leukemia. Vaccinations should not be received within three weeks prior to the show. Health Certificates are required.

Cats found to be ill or with parasites (fleas, ear mites, etc.) will not be allowed to show and will be dismissed from the grounds. No cat or kitten may enter the show if there is any (feline) infectious or contagious disease in the household within three weeks prior to the show date.

2. Youth should have a copy of their 4-H Dog ID form submitted

- by the May 1st deadline to the Extension Office.
3. All animal entries of bonafide Wyoming origin must be accompanied by an official health certificate issued at the point of origin by an accredited veterinarian. Certificates for dog entries must show current immunization as per state veterinary guidelines.
 4. All dogs must be on leash (excluding competition) and under control at all times. Dogs must not be taken near the stock barns. Once the 4-H dog show is completed, all dogs must be removed from the fairgrounds.
 5. Vicious dogs will be dismissed from the ring and must be removed from the premises.
 6. Females in season will be allowed in classes. However, they will go through at the end of all classes.
 7. Spayed, monorchid and neutered dogs may be shown without judging discrimination.
 8. Dogs must be clean and well groomed.
 9. The show committee reserves the right to ask anyone violating these rules to leave.
 10. Judging of classes will be done with AKC rules as guidelines, however, specific Wyoming 4-H Dog Show Rules (Rule number 1, 2, 3, and 4) will supersede AKC rules.
 11. No class will be held up for a contestant in a different State Show.

6. High in trial will be calculated on the basis of the raw qualifying score plus five additional points with each increase in level of difficulty.
7. Score Sheets: The Wyoming 4-H dog score sheets were designed for the benefit of 4-H members. They are intended as guides for judges. Judges use their discretion in deciding the seriousness of errors.
8. An exhibitor must show their dog with a six-foot leash.
9. Dogs soiling or urinating in the ring during judging will be disqualified.
10. Males and females will be shown in the same class. Females in heat will be shown last in the class and must be kept away from the obedience ring until call time.

All jelly products (jellies, jams, conserves, marmalades, butters) must be processed in a boiling water bath to be judged. Paraffin sealed jars will not be judged. Jelly products can be exhibited in one-half (1/2) cup regulation jars. 6. For food safety reasons, meat jerky entries must be prepared using methods recommended by the University of Wyoming Cooperative Extension Service, and the recipe must accompany the product.
